# From the Desk of Fr Kevin Redmond Straight to The Hearts

Last Sunday, June 29, the Church celebrated the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul. That we celebrated the feast day and not the 13<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time is an indication of how important this particular feast day is for the Church.

Each year, as we celebrate Saints Peter and Paul we can recognise how the Church is truly one, holy, catholic and apostolic, as the Creed says, but that we are not all the same. In a beautiful image St Paul (1 Cor 12) talks about the Church as one body and just as a body is made up of different parts, so is the Church.

St Peter represents the structures of the Church, the Papacy, Bishops, Dioceses, the rules and regulations that are so essential for us to function. We can recognise that as Christians have become divided into many churches and many communities the Catholic Church is big and united, it has many structures and ways of doing things. It can be seen as antiquated and stifling by its critiques. For many of our Christian brothers and sisters, the Catholics are one of the groups destined for hell. But for me, I see those elements not as drawbacks or things to change but as strengths and gifts from God. Being united with and under the Pope means that the Church is slow to change but our unity is preserved. We are not blown about by the latest fads or crazes. The different cultures from around the world are held together not by force but by what is essential and what unites us. Europeans do not see the world exactly as Australians do and those from Africa or South America see the world again in different ways. In the Gospel passage for the Solemnity, Jesus declares to Peter, that "you are the rock on which I will build my Church."

I admit I am not a builder, but foundations are important and it does not matter, in one sense, how beautiful the building is above ground, if the foundations are not strong, the building will not last. St Peter, the Papacy and the structures give the Church the strong foundation because Peter was able through God's grace to grasp the truth of Jesus and the hope that the life, death and resurrection of our Lord and Saviour gives us.

Strong foundations help the structure to survive regardless of what is thrown at it or the challenges it experiences. This is important because our faith is not a fairytale. There will be challenges and difficulties and I believe that the structures and the shape that our faith gives to our lives are so important in those challenging times. It is not that the faith gives us easy answers but the theology, liturgy and prayers of the community give us strength to see the future, even if in our grief and sadness we want to stop the world.

St Peter, the first Pope, is rightly celebrated, not because he was perfect. How many times did Peter struggle or misunderstand or not fully grasp the situation? But we celebrate St Peter because he remained faithful, he remained open to the promptings of God and allowed himself to be challenged and changed by God and didn't try and change or force God to suit himself, as for example Judas Iscariot did. Throughout the history of the Church, we have had good Popes and some that have not been so good but we pray so often for the Pope because the Papacy is so important for us. We pray in part that the Pope, like St Peter will be open to the promptings of the Holy Spirit, see the signs of the times and strive to present the faith to the world in ways that are relevant to it and yet remain faithful to the Church's history and traditions.

When we think of St Paul, we encounter another critical element in the Church. That the Church is missionary, we are called to "go out to the whole world; proclaim the gospel to all creation." (Mark 16:15). Our faith, is truly universal, that in all cultures and every place in our world Jesus can be encountered. We can recognise that for our Jewish and Muslim brothers and sisters will only encounter God in a certain language and in a certain culture.

For one of the first major disagreements in the Church was the discussion of whether believers in Jesus needed to follow Jewish traditions or not. We hear in the Acts of the Apostles about what is called the first Council, meeting in Jerusalem, and the decision was made that the Gentiles did not need to follow Jewish traditions to be true disciples of Jesus.

We know the story of St Paul well, how when we first heard of him, he was persecuting believers but after his conversion on the way to Damascus he became the Apostle to the Gentiles and the great missionary.

St Paul stressed that in his missionary journeys he only went to places that no one had visited before, he was the first to proclaim Jesus to them.

The Solemnity of Peter and Paul, challenge us to recognise the need to be open to God's promptings as Peter was and to be willing to be a witness to the truth before all people, just as Paul was, regardless of what it costs us.

But for the vast majority of us, we are not as free as Peter and Paul were to devote ourselves completely to Jesus. We have families, jobs, friends and a life here that makes it impossible to leave and go to the other side of the world. That is why it is important, I believe, to think about what it means to be missionary in our world today?

Yes, there are missionaries who leave their homeland and go to different parts of the world to proclaim Jesus. We have a number of priests and religious born overseas currently working in our Diocese and in our country. But for most of us, that is not possible, does that mean that we cannot be missionary? I believe that we are still missionary when we are able to witness to the truth of Jesus in our lives and world. If your family and friends are like mine, they have heard of Jesus, they may be able to point out where the local Church or Catholic School is but that does not mean that they have encountered Jesus.

Our faith is not just a set of rules or regulations, important as they can be. It is a relationship – God loves us and wants to draw us close. Jesus came to reveal the truth of God to us and so we are being drawn into the mystery of God in our day to day lives. Us witnessing to Jesus, is showing others by our words and deeds, the difference that faith makes in our lives. I hope and pray for each of us, that we can recognise that we are 'better', more fulfilled, have more meaning, peace and purpose with God in our lives than without. Yes, there are lots of things to learn about our faith, but knowledge is not as important as the heart. We are witnesses when we are able to be vulnerable and share from our hearts how the faith challenges and changes us.

Let us pray through the intercession of Saints Peter and Paul for our Church and for our world. These two important saints remind us that it is not about being right but about being open to God that is most important.
