FINANCIAL MATTERS ONCE AGAIN

I do not like to have to be talking about finances once again. However, I think it is important that parishioners are aware of the situation. Interestingly enough, the first point I'd like to make is concerning the first collection, commonly called the pastoral revenue collection. From this collection comes the support of our priests (their stepleds), their medical cover their housekeeping expensions and come of the collection comes the support of the collection comes the collection comes the support of the collection comes the collection collection comes the collection and some other incidentals. The reality is that due to the ongoing effects of Covid lockdowns and in normal times, I think a misunderstanding of the importance of this collection, the reserves of the Diocese are rapidly diminishing. This is because the only sources of income in this regard are the collections at Sunday Masses and also the Father's Day Appeal.

I bring this matter to your attention as it is uncertain how long the restrictions on Mass attendance are going to continue. I suspect it will be for a fairly long time. As well as this, it is becoming more common for people to use credit cards rather than carry cash with them and this has flowed over into church attendance. Of course, when the church is open, we do have the "tap and go" but that has very limited success.

With these points in mind, I would like to suggest that people who normally use credit cards or direct debit in their daily lives, give serious consideration to doing the same with their financial commitment to the parish. You can obtain the forms for this online from our parish website, or when the parish opens once again, from the parish office. Online at BPOINT you are able to designate where you're offering is going to go to first or second collection, Catholic foundation, and so on.

The other point that is worth mentioning is that the only income that the parish itself actually has at the moment are the monthly credit card donations and while we can survive for a little while with that, it is not a long-term solution with the recurrent expenditure of staff wages, maintenance, and normal parish expenses which are like the expenses each family experiences.



A number of parishes have made the decision to put all the collections into one bundle and divide them up 30/70 which is approximately the average if the collections were counted separately. We have experimented with this at St Andrews, and it seems to work accurately, so we will continue doing this which will ensure at least a basic support for the pastoral revenue account.

From Monsignor Ron ...

I guess we could entitle this week's readings the "Miracle of the Loaves." We have the miracle regarding food in our first reading by Elisha. In this miracle not only does the food prove to be adequate but there is also food left over. Then we have Jesus feeding over 5000 people with five loaves and a couple of fish. And once again there is plenty left over.

What is important in St John's gospel is that the sequel to the miracle of the loaves are set out at great length in one of the most important of all the discourses given by Jesus. In fact, for us, this discourse will provide the gospel reading for next two Sundays. We shall hear again Jesus telling the people not to become more excited about bread that perishes. Rather, he says, "Work for food which in due is to eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you." Then he goes on to say: "I am the bread come down from heaven that anyone who eats this bread will live for ever: and the bread that I shall give you as my flesh, for the life of the world."

What we do need to remember particularly in the case of our reading from St John's gospel is that the people gladly received this gift of food but in many ways failed to appreciate the giver. Also, we need to remember the multiplication of the loaves is but a hint of something greater to come. We need to remember that throughout the Hebrew history, God feeds his people both physically with food and spiritually with wisdom and both are expressions of his loving care, and both are equally important. The wisdom here is the faith and insight which are needed to put people in a right relationship with God. The invitation is always given that the response is not always forthcoming.

The point is that the physical hunger the people experienced was but a surface reminder of that deeper hunger by which we yearn constantly for God. Elsewhere in the gospel, Jesus teaches that his food is to do the father's will and to complete his work on earth. We need to think about this. We are truly blessed that God's nourishing word is proclaimed to us at our regular worship. The Sacred Scriptures help us to grow in our knowledge of the Lord and challenge us to adjust our living to his word. But we need to remember this is something that grows day by day. I would suggest the message is that now is the moment to seek the wisdom that comes from God and to realise that this is a lifelong journey.

GET VACCINATED FOR THE COMMON GOOD

Vaccination against COVID-19 is a morally good thing, providing protection for the person vaccinated and the wider community. Some COVID-19 vaccines are associated with ethically questionable production and research practices, but Pope Francis and the Australian Bishops have advised that it is morally permissible to receive any vaccine made available.

Reflection from Pope Francis

Love pushes us to go beyond the why, and instead to ask for whom, to pass from asking, "Why am I alive?" to "For whom am I living?" From "Why is this happening to me?" to "Whom can I help?" For whom? We can waste years thinking about ourselves, without ever actually starting to love. ...

Not only doubts and questions can undermine great and generous choices, but many other obstacles as well every day. Feverish consumerism can overwhelm our hearts with superfluous things. An obsession with pleasure may seem the only way to escape problems, yet it simply postpones them. A fixation with our rights can lead us to neglect our responsibilities to others. Then, there is the great misunderstanding about love, which is more than powerful emotions, but primarily a gift, a choice, and a sacrifice.

The art of choosing well, especially today, means not seeking approval, not plunging into a consumerist mentality that discourages originality, and not giving into the cult of appearances. Choosing life means resisting the "throwaway culture" and the desire to have "everything now", in order to direct our lives towards the goal of heaven, towards God's dreams. ...

In the meantime, we will continue to keep you informed on updates either by phone or email.



Pastoral letter to the faithful of the Diocese of Parramatta on COVID-19

Dear sisters and brothers,

"For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 8:38-39)

I am sure that these words of St Paul are particularly pertinent to us as a Christian community as we endure the "second wave" of this pandemic with an increasing outbreak of the COVID-19 "delta variant."

Having perhaps lulled ourselves into thinking that lockdowns were a thing of the past we find ourselves once again restricted in terms of our lives, and in particular, our capacity to access the Sacraments which are so fundamental to Catholic life.

I thank the pastors of our Diocese for their continuing efforts to maintain contact with the members of their parish communities, for the live streaming of liturgy, and other ways in which pastoral care is being offered particularly to those who are alone or facing other challenges.

As responsible citizens and faithful Catholics, in solidarity with our doctors and nurses, we must comply with health orders for the sake of the common good. The Gospel calls us to practice such solidarity in these difficult days.

We are also reminded that part of our identity as Catholics is our sense of engagement with one another through the celebration of the Eucharist which binds us to Christ and to those who gather with us. Whilst this communion cannot be impaired (even by a lockdown) the lack of being able to physically gather as the Body of Christ obviously can impact our sense of belonging. It is in these circumstances that we must endeavour to be sacramental to those in our families and those we are able to be in contact with by showing the face of Christ and allowing God's love to manifest in us.

May we also use these days to deepen our prayer and spiritual lives. Our Diocesan websites www.catholicoutlook.org, particularly www.thewell.org.au contain some good and helpful information about how we can follow this path of deeper prayer, meditation and spiritual reading.

Please be assured that as your Bishop you are all constantly in my prayers, and I long for the day when once again we can express our faith tangibly by gathering in our various places of worship to celebrate the Eucharist and express that joy which comes from our faith in Jesus Christ.
